Pastor's Pen



Dear HTK Parish Family,

It is good to see the Belong magazine back in production after a six-month hiatus. Since the last edition of Belong, our world has certainly been turned upside-down owing to the Coronavirus pandemic. I have heard some stories from parishioners about how their parents told them what it was like to live through the Spanish flu pandemic. I guess in years to come, the younger generation who will be tomorrow's parents will also be able to tell their children about living through the Coronavirus pandemic in 2020 and what that was like.

The restrictions surrounding the control of Coronavirus has certainly led us into a desert-like experience. Some people have lost their jobs and others have seen their businesses fold. Some people have not been able to spend the last moments with their loved ones as they die with Coronavirus. Families have been separated-children from parents and parents from children, grandchildren from grandparents and grandparents from grandchildren. Fear of running out of food and other household essentials saw some dog-eat-dog shopping in some supermarkets as people vied for tinned tomatoes, pasta, rice, flour and yes, even toilet paper- making Australia the butt of many jokes!

Maintaining social distancing has been a real pain when all you want to do is give a person a hug. Everywhere you go, it's sanitizer and sanitizing. There have been security guards at various shops, counting the number of people going in and out. At times, you have needed to queue to go shopping. You have to have a flu vax certificate to visit in an aged care home. During the time of lockdown, a number of elderly folks have got sicker as they have not been able to get out and about as they had before. Staying inside for four months has meant slowing down.

Here at Church, I had to develop a large Covid-Safe policy which made practical the Church Industrial Plan Covid Safe Policy. We had to add Covid-Safe Warden to the list of volunteers needed at HTK. We have also had to measure up the Church and make sure social distancing is adhered to. Red stickers appeared on seats. The cup was suspended from Holy Communion. At the beginning, Church was done solely live stream which was a very dry experience compared to preaching to a Church full.

So, with all of these interruptions to life and even now, having to embrace what many call a "new normal", we can feel as if we are in the desert and it's dry, barren and fruitless in many areas of life compared with what we had. Not only that, we still have the Covid enemy lurking out there and we are not sure where it is and if it is going to overtake us like thirst does when you run out of water in the desert.

But in the midst of the desert, may people have discovered streams- flowing, life-giving water. Many families have reconnected. No longer has it meant that the weekends mean Mum and Dad and the kids going off in different directions. Families started to play and do activities together. Some people spent time learning a new skill- how to bake cakes and slices, how to cook more than just meat and three veg, learning computer operation or social media or taken up a new hobby. Some people have caught up on those jobs they wanted to do around the house. Ladies have gotten around to finish their many unfinished craft projects. Many people also learnt about Zoom and Zoom meetings! With the closing of a number of organizations, activities and clubs we have been involved in, many people have just enjoyed having a good rest.

So, it hasn't been all dry bones and skeletons. Over the years of studying the Bible, I have always been amazed at how God uses those dry times, those desert times to teach and shape his people's lives for the future. Not long ago, we heard about Elijah in the wilderness and God taking him to the top of Mt Sinai to reveal himself in a theophany and reinvigorate Elijah to go back and continue his mission. In the wilderness, God made Israel journey for 40 years to get the Egypt out of them so that they could enter the Promised Land. Even Jesus, after being baptized and filled with the Holy Spirit was sent out into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil so that when he started his public ministry, he was reinforced in the power of the Word and given shape as to what it would mean in the everyday life of his ministry, that He was the Beloved Son of God upon whom the favour of God rested.

Keeping you Covid-Safe at HTK

In order that we can operate as a Church and have services and other activities, we must follow the guidelines set down by the Queensland Government Industrial Covid-Safe Plan for Churches. We not only follow this plan so that we can have our Church open, but also that you can be safe knowing everything is being done that can be done to keep you Covid-Safe while at HTK.

For your information, this is what we do.

- 1. Control the number of people entering the church or building. According to the 4sq.m. per person rule, we can have 49 people in the Church and 27 in the café area. This is why we ask you to register for the service you attend so that we can monitor the numbers.
- 2. Observing social distancing rules (1.5 m) when entering and exiting the church or building. Yellow markers are placed on the floor to help you with this. So that there is no overlap, you enter and exit the Church via different doorways.
- 3. Red markers are put on the seats in the Church, measured at 1.5 mtrs to ensure physical distancing to the extent possible. Signage is displayed reminding people of the physical distancing requirements.
- 4. Yellow markers are placed on the floor to maintain social distancing throughout Holy Communion. Communion is given in one kind (the bread). Your hands are sanitized before receiving the bread. The priest also has a strict Covid-Safe protocol to follow which involves regular sanitization of hands.
- 5. Seat all persons separately on the allocated seating (this does not apply to people who reside in the same household).
- 6. Covid-Safe Wardens are allocated to the Church and hall to ensure Covid-Safe practices are followed.
- 7. Hand sanitiser is available at the entrance of the church building and the hall when events are held there.
- 8. Adequate airflow through the building will happen through a door on either side being open.
- 9. Liquid soap and disposable towels are available in all toilet facilities.
- 10. Handwashing signage is displayed at the entrance to the Church and in the toilet facilities.
- 11. People who are sick, even mildly so, should stay at home and get tested.

 We are doing our best to do everything possible to keep you Covid-Safe when attending HTK so that you can feel at peace about coming to Church.

WHERE the LIVING WATERS FLOW

As you can easily see from this Magazine, there's been a LOT of things happening at HTK over the last few Covid months, and as we come back together as church there's STILL a lot happening – even more in fact!

One of the pluses of Covid (yes, think creatively here folks!) is that all the church rosters were rendered null and void! Just think of it – all those people normally involved in reading, praying, serving tea and coffee, welcoming people, taking up the collection, assisting in the sanctuary, helping out in the office, all out of work! For such a long time, all the volunteer roles in the Sunday worship services could only be filled by the "team of 5" led by Fr Steve that faithfully brought us Sunday services by live-stream for ages and ages. We appreciate your work! Thanks for your faithfulness and diligence!

Now that we are coming slowly back to church – how good that we can have up to 75 people at services now! – we are asking people both HOW they plan to come back to worship and what part they are prepared to take in our church as we meet together each week. While the Parish's Covid safe plan has requirements to ensure people's continued safety, there are many roles that people could take up over the coming months.

As part of the Parish's Strategic Plan initiated in 2019, Strategy 5 is all about this. It states: We will effectively apply the gifts, talents and strengths of all members in pursuit of our Mission and Vision.

Every one of you reading this has a valuable and unique role to play in our parish life. Maybe over this time of isolation you have thought about what is your role in the church community or about what you miss most when you could only attend on-line. One of the things that the Strategy 5 team has reflected on over this time has been that as we start back with parish activities, people should be asked to commit to *something* for just one year. So, if for example you decide to assist with morning tea after the worship service or to assist at Young and Awesome, you are volunteering for one year only, not forever and ever amen, unless you choose at the end of the year to offer again. YOU choose what you would like to be involved in. Maybe it will be something quite different from what you have done in the pre-Covid church – the one year time limit will give you a chance to try it out.

There is of course no saying that you can't do more than one thing – we just ask that if you do, you commit to the year. At this stage, however, we are looking to fill roles for the rest of 2020. The "year" will roll over at the end of January 2021. So, right now is the time to taste a variety of different roles if you would like to!

He is saying, "Stop. Listen. Trust. Peace."


INTERGENERATIONAL SERVICE

Many of you will remember Peter and Shirley Best-Russell, long time members of HTK Church who are now residents at Tricare Aged Care at Warana. When Tricare was just a building site along the Nicklin Way, Peter rang the number on the signboard to offer on behalf of HTK Church to bring regular church services to the facility once it was built. They told him to make contact when the building work was completed. So he did and was one of the first to knock on their doors when the facility first opened. In the many years since then, regular monthly services, led sometimes by Peter and sometimes by parish clergy, have been held and have brought God's word of hope and comfort to Tricare residents.

Peter and Shirley moved into care there and have been on the receiving end of the services for the last year. Then, along came Covid, and visitors have been

barred from the common areas of the facility. Peter asked if he could lead a morning prayer service for residents on Easter Day and management gave him the okay to do so. Around a dozen residents of a range of Christian denominations attended and they asked if he could do a prayer service every week! Management were surprised but pleased, and Peter has been leading a prayer and praise service every week since! Shirley is in charge of the music ministry, using some of their many worship CDs to brighten and encourage residents at the service.

It is wonderful that God has placed Peter in the right place at the right time to be able to perform this ministry from the INSIDE when people from the OUTSIDE are unable to go in for services. Peter and Shirley look forward to the happy day when Rev Steve will again be allowed to come in and share Holy Communion with residents, but until then these frail but faithful servants of God will continue in active service of the Lord. 

COMMUNITY BREAKFAST

HTK Community Breakfast has recommenced.



Before the Covid shutdown, HTK community breakfast was feeding about 30 hungry people on a Tuesday morning. We had to stop when Covid hit due to regulations from the Government and the Diocese. Fortunately, we have been able to start up again, with some restrictions and some new requirements to meet our Covid plan.



We are now limited to about 20 visitors and 5 volunteers at any one time, but we can cater for more if required with multiple sittings. Volunteers who are handling food are required to wear masks and gloves. To date, our numbers have grown to 14, and appear to be growing each week.

A number of those who had been sleeping rough have been housed and fed through winter with various government initiatives to protect them from the virus, but some of those initiatives will soon end. We believe the need for permanent affordable

accommodation is still as vital as ever, as too is the need for stop-gap services like our community breakfast.

Thank you to all the volunteers who make this ministry possible. Thanks also to those who helped at our recent

Bunnings sausage sizzle to help finance our breakfasts, and to those who donate food and clothing for distribution. We are making a difference.








HOPE SPRINGS through SPRINGS of HOPE

o date Springs of Hope Foundation has given out a total of 1,240 food hampers over a period of 19 weeks (60 food hampers every week) to the elderly, persons with disabilities, child-headed households, and other vulnerable members of the community in the targeted areas. We work closely with the local community cluster

magine 1**,240** food with hampers, enough nutritional beans, maize and green vegetables to feed a family of four for a week.

That's 34,720 meals that these children may have missed out on.



artha and the girls report that the elderly are often reduced to tears of relief and gratitude when our crew arrive with our food hampers and facemasks. Often saying that there is no food in the house and that they have not eaten in a couple of days.

I hile Springs of Hope Foundation targets the elderly, disabled, child-headed households, and very needy within the county we also work closely with other community organizations such as the Lions Club, Rotary and Rotaract clubs to get as many much-needed facemasks out to the remote communities as quickly as possible. Below are some of those beneficiaries.



hile we are not able to function as a school at the moment, we are still able to provide a Safehouse for the girls who were living with us in March, when the government ordered all schools closed. The girls have continued to learn as they sew masks to give to those in need.

ome of the girls were due to graduate in June 2020. Although no

family members were present to celebrate the young women's proud achievements, Martha and Beryl managed to arrange a memorable graduation ceremony with just their fellow students in attendance.

MUSIC Ministry

I also shared a Dropbox folder with the members of our music team where I uploaded backing tracks I recorded on the digital piano, to allow our group to practise at home.

It was wonderful when we were allowed to practise together again (socially distanced), however our team numbers have dwindled due to a number of different circumstances. We are also trialling different ways of recording the worship in an endeavour to get a reasonable quality for our "online" viewers, and this provides its own difficulties and frustrations.

Nevertheless, we will continue to provide music for the 10am service and the Living Waters service. We may be fewer in number, but we still have heart for worshipping our Lord and we hope that our passion ignites a flame within those who are listening or singing along with us.

He was also heavily involved in the prayer ministry VMTC and a number of people at HTK, including Sylvia and Ron became involved in it.


It was good to hear more about the beginning of the flow of the Holy Spirit at HTK so that we can be encouraged and look for more as we move into the future with our Living Waters movement.

For Pentecost at home, we did put on red shirts for the service. Missing our morning teas at church and the beautiful egg sandwiches, we started making our own. I was doing too much with 3 casual jobs and full-time study,


I finally had a day off and did not feel so cruddy.

Answering God's Call

On New Year's Day 2019 we prayed that God would make known to us what He would like us to do in 2019. It came as a surprise to us (although it shouldn't have) that we were contacted within a couple of hours by Bishop Murray Harvey, Bishop of Grafton Diocese. The surprise was really that a Bishop was working on New Year's Day! We were asked to prepare the Parish of Nambucca Heads, about 30 kms south of Coffs Harbour, for the restructure that the whole Diocese was to undertake.





The Parish of Nambucca Heads had two churches — St John The Baptist in Nambucca Heads and St James' Bowraville. St James is the original church in the Nambucca Valley and heritage listed as it is more than 120 years old.

As we were working towards the restructure (amalgamating the Nambucca Heads Parish with the adjoining Macksville Parish, to provide ministry for the whole of the Nambucca Valley) the first emergency happened. The bush fires started to burn towards Bowraville and at one time it looked like the whole town would burn.

With much prayer and a change of wind direction the town was spared. Incredible damage was done to the surrounding areas, and even today the area has not recovered. 61 registered homes were lost in the Nambucca Valley, and just as many "unregistered dwellings" were also lost during the fires.



The St James' Hall was the official evacuation

centre for the area and was a 'hive of activity' as we assisted many people with accommodation, food, clothes and other necessities. We were extremely blessed by a

local electrical store owner who gave us two fridge/ freezers. These were the very modern ones which could be changed from fridge to freezer at the push of a button! The two fridges were to be given to the Church for use at the monthly Community Meal after the fires.

There was so much food given to assist the community that we started a Food Hub at Bowraville. This has gone from strength to strength and then, in connection with Food Hub Australia and Anglicare, we started St John's Food Services in Nambucca Heads to cater for homeless, disadvantaged and elderly residents.





The Bowraville hub is a very large Food Hub which supports Bowraville and the many surrounding smaller communities. The downside of this is that it has taken over the church hall. When we left, there were plans in place to move the Food Hub into a vacant shop in the main street, in the very near future as soon as the Food Hub can sustain the cost of renting the premises. The St James' operation has over 50 families on their books while the St John's operation has grown in stature at Nambucca and now has a clientele of over 50 people.

After such devastation we thought a bit of fun was in order and organised a Nativity Trail through both Bowraville and Nambucca Heads. The idea was to have some sheep hidden in the shop windows. The children, and as it turned out many adults, would get a



sheet and note the name of each sheep, which was decided by the shop owner, and when they had collected 20 names could bring their sheet to the Food Hub at Bowraville or the Church at Nambucca Heads and receive a Goodie Bag, which contained a copy of a book telling the original Christmas Story, a few novelties and activities and advertising for our Christmas Services. This was a great success, and some even wanted to know if we would do something similar for Easter! Of course, we also put some Christmas lights on the Churches!





to Minister in Nambucca Heads

As Covid-19 impacted the region and the churches were locked down, we began looking for ways to heighten the profile of the parish and let the local community know we were still alive. At Easter we erected a wooden cross at the front of each church, and added the lights to it, so that it was visible at night. This was another great success, with many comments and questions from the community.

The parish has a very viable Op Shop, grossing over \$110,000 per annum. However, the management has not been compliant with Diocesan guidelines, so one of our final challenges was to ensure the Op Shop was compliant with the Diocesan Protocols. After 18 months this was achieved just before we came home.

Bishop Murray had originally set us the task of assessing the viability of the Parish and if positive then to move the Parish forward transitioning the worshipping communities into lively vibrant units. At St John's in Nambucca Heads this involved the church community transitioning from pews to a more flexible style of furniture that would permit more contemporary and multi-age worship, while at St James' in Bowraville it needed to be more community engagement.



The aftermath of the bushfires in Bowraville established strong links within the community and cemented the place of the Anglican Church firmly within the local setting while the financial viability of the Parish was confirmed with the Op Shop investments. That only left the task of helping the Nambucca Heads community to embrace more flexible worship options. This again was achieved within days of our return home.

It seems that some good had come out of Covid-19, because we were blessed to have chairs provided on loan from the Parish of Ballina as a trial when the pews

were removed. These chairs were easily separated to make the church Covid-19 compliant and people had a chance to become accustomed to new furniture. So it is true ... God does work in mysterious ways!

Early in July we came home for a rest. During that time we were informed that Bishop-in-Council, the Grafton equivalent of our Diocesan Council, had accepted the plan for the restructure of Nambucca Heads and Macksville as the Ministry Area of Nambucca Valley. Part of this plan is the Parish Profile (the job description) for the new minister. This is now circulating, and our job is finished.



We went back with the intention of only staying a short time to tie up all the loose ends and plan our return home. However just a little earlier than we planned the Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk announced the borders would be closed. We scraped home with a day to spare and are delighted to be catching up with old friends and enjoy the peace and beauty of Lake Kawana where our home unit is situated.
