# Pastor's Pen



Dear HTK Parish Family,

In another Parish a few years ago we installed a variable lettering sign in front of the church. We used the sign to advertise Parish events. As a strategy to have people read the messages, we would occasionally put a humorous message on the board. Perhaps the greatest attention was achieved when we put a message on the board saying "Having trouble sleeping? Come and listen to one of our sermons." It made the local newspaper and we were amused when the reporter interviewing us asked if we realise the message had a double meaning!

Another sign we used was "CH - - CH. What's missing?" Obviously, the letters UR play upon the image that "You are" missing and there is not church unless UR there.

The "CH - - CH. What's missing?" message has become very relevant in the last two years as people have found new ways of "being in church" without actually being in church. This has led many church leaders to question the so-called "legitimacy" of non-church attendance. This leads us to reflect upon ways that people regard as "being church" and the challenges faced by "Team HTK" as we find new meanings of "being church".

Firstly, we do not **GO** to church – we **ARE** the church: The experience is in the plural and this calls for a team response because the experience of church is plural based on the idea that "being church" is a plural (communal) experience. Church remains bigger than an individual.

We notice that spirituality is becoming an individual pursuit, not a communal activity. What we mean by this is growth of isolation caused by the pandemic increased the impact of brokenness and unhealthy cultures, resulting in many people retreating to work things out for themselves.

At a time when many people appear devoted mostly to themselves, it would seem that attending church is becoming a personal spiritual discipline as many who used to go to church don't go any more. We now find people either whose faith has not grown or whose faith no longer has the same importance in their daily life it once had. In response to this concern, Team HTK needs to respond in ways that will help people to reconnect because rarely does decreased church attendance result in increased devotion.

The pandemic experience has certainly caused a re-think about who/what/how is "church" experienced and, in what may seem to be a contradiction, there are some aspects of "being church" today that were previously considered as "not being church" yet are now part of the life of the Christian community. Let's look at a few ...

Watching church on-line was once considered as a poor substitute for "being in church" and to many people going on-line was considered as stepping out of church. Now, for many going on-line is their only church, not because it's easier but because it's their only opportunity to "share church". Team HTK needs to maintain and develop the links with those on-line by offering a good quality opportunity to gather both physically and electronically because on-line viewers are worthy of our best. Just as a poor worship experience causes many to go elsewhere, a poor quality on-line presence causes many to look elsewhere.

Charities are amazing but they're not "the church". Team HTK has responded to the call to continue supporting our mission by giving, both on-line and through the offertory plate. There has also been a need to consider what "tithing" really means ... whether it is the work of the church or work in the broader community. Since 2020, many people have seen that the gathered community of faith (the church) is their first priority when giving to the ministry of the church.

**Coffee with friends** remains an important part of maintaining contact with one another but it can never replace gathering as a community of faith sharing worship, prayer, community, joining together on a mission, and growing into the likeness of Christ .. that's "being church".

# Pastor's Pen

Communing with God by a walk on the beach or along a mountain track have always been ways for a person to feel closer to God, however many people are now finding imaginative ways of using such experiences of subjective feelings to achieve a connection with the broader mission of the church. Members of Team HTK are finding ways of greeting people as they walk and of sharing their faith as opportunities arise.

A steady diet of family devotions hasn't been seen as being "church" in past times. However, currently many families have continued (if not expanded) their times for the family to gather in the current environment a crucial aspect of "being church". Some families have found on-line. Team HTK is called to help families in their endeavours to provide on-going faith development for younger members of our community.

Church surfing has become a phenomenon we, as a church, need to become aware of. This is an expression of our consumer culture where some attend multiple services at multiple churches without making a real commitment to any of the churches visited. While somewhat linked to Church Shopping, we should not confuse the two issues facing today's church where people are genuinely seeking a new church community where they can become active and regular worshippers.

Anonymity is one concern that the "Team HTK" project has tried to address. Anonymity occurs when people don't engage, don't serve, don't invite, don't join the mission. They just ... sit. The month of May has been a time when we have been actively thinking of how we engage in ministry as members of the "Body of Christ" (the church) in this place. It is hard to build the future of HTK Church on someone who consumes and does contributes, and so our Parish Leadership has called us all to "re-invent ourselves" and look at what we can do to forward the mission of our church ... by contributing, inviting, giving and being.

As we reflect on the call for us to **BE** the church, let us consider three questions ...

Are my current patterns of "being church" leading me to a greater devotion to Jesus?

Am I serving, inviting, giving and helping to make new disciples?

Is this really about me, or is it about seeing the Kingdom of God flourish and expand around me?

We conclude with a quote from Carey Nieuwof (see Footnote) ...

"In an era where everything has become hyper-individualist and hyper-convenient, it is wonderful to get together and participate in something that inconveniences me, challenges me, stretches me, grows me, makes me uncomfortable and does something great for the world in the name of Jesus.

"When the early church did just that, it changed not only millions of lives, it changed history."

#### SUPPORTING COMMUNITY ABROAD

On March 11th 2020 the World Health Organization officially declared COVID-19 a pandemic—and turned all of our lives upside down. One year ago this week. A hug went from a warm greeting to a health hazard. We were forced to separate from friends and family; tragically, some of us lost friends and family. The first case of Covid 19 was detected in Kenya on March 13th. The government immediately sprang into action, closing all schools, small shops, open markets, factories and basically any means of employment where the wage earner was surviving on a bare minimum salary to begin with, and no backup savings. Often, if a son or daughter had a job in one of the larger cities, money was sent home to elderly parents each month to enable them to pay for the minimum essentials of food and shelter.



Being a school, we were told to close Kijiji Mission and send all of our students home to their overcrowded slums. Fortunately, we were able to convince the area officials to let most of our students stay with us, where they would be safe. We just weren't allowed to function as a school, meaning that Martha could no longer follow her curriculum.

Not a problem! There was an immediate need for facemasks. So we got to work making facemasks to be given out to anyone in the community who couldn't afford to purchase one. With the help of local Lions Club, Rotary, Rotaract Club and local small NGO's we were able to get thousands of facemasks out to the most vulnerable in our community as quickly as possible. Within a very short time it became obvious that women who relied on a few dollars a day to feed their children by doing washing, housework or selling in the markets had nothing to feed their families.

As soon as we were out of our two week quarantine period at the end of March, we did our first food hamper distribution program, and we've been doing them every week ever since. Our focus is the elderly, child-headed households and people living with disabilities. One valuable lesson that has come out of our journey through 2020 is that this segment of the population will need our assistance long after the "new normal" sets in.

Martha and Ephantus have committed themselves to doing the food distribution on weekends for as long as Springs of Hope Foundation can afford to provide the food and a small petrol allowance for his donated vehicle. Last weekend we were able to distribute 190 food hamers to the elderly and people living with disabilities. Each hamper contains enough food to feed a family of four for two weeks. On most food distribution occasions we are able to do more than provide much needed food.





We usually come across situations where the family needs additional assistance or counselling. These two brothers were both born blind. Ephantus was able to assist their mother by getting them enrolled into a school in Nakuru that caters to the special needs of blind children. Something their single mother would never have known how to go about doing.

Finally, on September 1st we were able to bring in new students. Primary and high schools were still closed, but as a vocational school Kijiji Mission was able to begin teaching again. We'd built up a backlog of very needy women who were eager to join our 12 month program. Most had been recommended by the area chiefs who we met when doing our food distribution

program. Unfortunately, we can only bring them in one at a time, placing them in our now unused volunteer house for a two week quarantine period. We've been admitting new students for the past six months and we still have women on the waiting list.

At last, the students who began their 12 month training with us in January 2020 will be graduating at the end of this month. Normally graduation is a huge celebration. Families often hire a minivan to bring the many family members who want to be part of their graduation ceremony. Sadly, like the last graduation ceremony in August 2020, only the students and staff will be able to celebrate their many accomplishments and personal sacrifices during the past 16 months.

GIRLS WILL BE GIRLS What can I say

As part of their 12 month training the young ladies have to be skilled at not only making school uniforms and special occasion outfits for their clients. They have to learn to measure and sew for a full bridal party, from flower girl dresses to wedding gowns. *And, of course, each student wants her picture taken in her beautiful creation*.

HTK, thank you for being part of our unexpected, unpredictable journey. During the past 12 months we've learned that we're capable of doing many things when called to serve. Such as instantly pivoting from being a vocational training school to a mass production facility. By the way, the girls loved being in a position to give back to their communities, and often worked on the facemasks through their lunch break and on weekends.

We've learned so much about the unaddressed needs of the elderly and people living with disabilities. During the past 12 months, because of your generous support we've been able to assist in our small way. We are committed to continuing with that program, and hopefully seeing it grow.

But, most importantly 2020 has shown us all that, when the going gets tough, the very best in everyone comes out. Martha, Ephantus, Beryl, and our students did an outstanding job of getting everyone through a very stressful 12 months. My huge gratitude and thanks goes out to our team in Kenya and to our generous supporters all over the world who make it all possible,

## ANZAC DAY








As Anzac Day was on a Sunday this year, the theme of the service was "sacrificial love".

Once we had our section, we then said the Lords Prayer and sometimes we were brave enough to try and read it in the language of the section.


Lara read out the Lords Prayer in Portuguese, Janet read in German, Harriet in






