Pastor's Pen



Dear HTK Parish Family,

On March 1st, we officially began the season of Autumn. Now, we may have a number of hot days ahead of us still, but it is still Autumn. Living where we do on the Sunshine Coast, it is hard to really get the full impact of the beauty of this season. In New Zealand, Autumn was an absolutely spectacular time of year. The various shades of orange, brown and yellow leaves radiated absolute beauty. As the days get shorter and cooler, those leaves fall, and bright mosaics form on the floors of the forests and the parks. Autumn leads into winter- the time of bitter cold, gusty wind, gloomy days, stark landscapes and even snow and ice. Autumn is the time in New Zealand when you get your firewood ready for the winter and your chimney swept.

When I was in the Lutheran Church, there was a series of songbooks published which featured the music of a very popular Adelaide Lutheran songwriter. His name was Robin Mann. In 1977, he wrote the words to a song called, "One by one you call us home."

*Like Autumn leaves upon the ground,
We know not where we should be bound.
The rain comes hard and night rolls in;
The sky is black and it's cold within,
And one by one you call us home.*

*Bright is the sun and pale the moon,
With winking stars, they sing your tune.
The sunset comes, you paint the sky-
The darkness falls like a lullaby,
And one by one, you call us home.*

*You do not sit and take your ease;
You wash our feet upon your knees,
Shoulder the load that holds us down,
Untie the ropes that have kept us bound,
And one by one, you call us home.*

*Come walk with me; both old and young,
No other way can take you home.
Here's bread and wine to keep you strong
Until we meet for the final song,
And one by one, you call us home.*

It's a beautiful song. I feel that the imagery of it suits perfectly the season of Lent that we have just begun recently. In Lent, we remember the journey of Jesus to the cross. It is his journey to death for us. Traditionally, Lent has been a season of fasting and repentance or as the old saying goes, "Giving something up for Lent." These practices are "a dying to something." They remind us that we too are dying.



When the autumn leaves fall to the ground, they remind us that life does not go on forever. There comes a time when we all must fall from the tree of this life. Some fresh, young, healthy leaves fall before what we would say is their time. Others remain on the tree for many, many years and fall only when they are very old and shrivelled up. Death is all around us.

Early in February, we were sad to hear of the death of Pearl Robinson's parents, both elderly, who died on the same day. The members of my former diocese in Nelson, New Zealand are still reeling in shock and grieving with the Dean of the Nelson Cathedral, the Very Rev. Mike Hawke and his wife, Patsy, whose son aged 42 died of an aortic tear in mid-January and then their daughter, a few years younger, died of a blood clot in early February. How do you come to terms with that? Then recently, I went to Toowoomba to officiate at the funeral of the son of one of my neighbourhood friends who died from pancreatic cancer at the age of 43. When those autumn leaves drop, we do not know. "But one by one, you call us home." As the writer of Psalm 32 says, "Our times are in God's hands."

In Lent, we are reminded that the shadow of death covers the journey to the cross for Jesus. We also are reminded that this journey is the journey "home" for Him and by extension and grace, his people- "One by one you call **us** home." That same shadow of death covers our earthly journeys. But the One who first went that way of the cross for us, does not leave us empty and ill-equipped for the journey. By his rising from the dead, he has set us free from the power of sin and death- "Untie the ropes that has kept us bound." He has shown us the way to live by washing our feet and teaching us to live life as a servant- "You wash our feet upon your knees." He has given us food for the journey in the Sacrament of Holy Communion- "Here's bread and wine to make you strong."

The One who made creation- "Bright is the sun and pale the moon, with winking stars, they sing your tune" is the One who invites us to journey through this life that is shadowed by death but not conquered by it- "Come walk with me: both young and old." One day our faith will turn to sight and we will "meet for the final song." "Praise and glory and wisdom and thanks and honour and power and strength be to our God forever and ever. Amen" (Rev. 7:12)

The autumn leaves do fall to the ground. But for those who are "in Christ," this is the journey home. Beyond death, there is life. Beyond Autumn and Winter, there is Spring. Beyond Lent, there is Easter. Beyond Good Friday, there is Resurrection and life forever! So, in the solemnity of Lent, be encouraged by what lies ahead. For though we live surrounded by death, we are in life and on our way home! Amen.

These times may not be accurate in some instances, but are as best as I recall to share our wonderful memories with Father Michael.
Reminiscing, from Myrna.

First of all
When we were invited to Beerwah Parish for Fr. Michael's 50th anniversary of being called to be a Deacon, there was a good contingent from Holy Trinity, and the food was sumptuous. Cathy, Michael's wife, had a marvellous sense of humour, and she sang "Stand by your Man" as well as thanking us for "putting up with Michael". (Tongue in cheek, noted for his long sermons).

Sometime after that we bumped into Cathy and Michael at the Brisbane airport, and did not know that Cathy was unwell with heart and other problems. Shortly after that she died. Their large family were bereft, and we knew Michael had lost a wonderful helpmate, and fellow Christian in their lives together.

When Fr Kevin Lewis was our Rector, he and Fr Michael organised a "Coming of the Light" ceremony, with a lantern and good intentions to row themselves from the other side of the lake, and the congregation would meet and greet them on the nearby shore outside our Church.

So much for plans !!

A terrible squall came up, rain and wind lashed their little boat, and the light was so dull or extinguished, we couldn't see much at all. We were all dismayed, and didn't know whether to dash to the Church for cover, by then all soaked and dripping, or wait for Kevin and Michael to land out of the heaving boat somehow.

Some strong and brave chaps helped the two sailors to bring the tossed about boat ashore, and the ceremony was hurriedly decided a few words, and then aborted. We all needed a nice hot cuppa, and some went home asap to dry out. Anyway, the good Lord knew the intentions of Kevin and Michael, so Light had arrived, welcome and shining out of our Church building, despite the plans of men !!

FRANK SCHELLENBERGER RETIRES

Baptised at Holy Trinity, Coburg in Victoria, Frank has come full circle at Holy Trinity, Kawana.

Frank was in the choir and a member of Church of England Boy's Society, CEBS, until he went overseas in 1946. After travelling between various places in the Pacific in 1951 for the Commonwealth, Frank was posted to Rabaul in PNG where he became a member of St Georges Anglican Church. He served on Vestry at Church of St. George and helped out until the new church was built.

Frank and Margaret met in PNG and they were married in Australia in 1964 and went back for a final term in Rabaul. By the time Frank and Margaret returned to Australia in 1966, he held the position of an Assistant Surveyor (qualified).

Back in Australia Frank went to work for the Victorian Government and was also licenced as a Lay reader to St. Francis in the Fields where he held Evensong when available.

After moving to the coast in 1975 Frank became an LA in St. Luke's, Wurtulla then Holy Trinity, when built, and in 1991 he moved to Beerwah and was an LA at the four small churches in the area. By now he was a licenced Auctioneer, and in 1992 was given the task of selling some of the church buildings.

Frank and Margaret have been part of our parish family from the beginning and Frank was responsible for training our Liturgical Assistants for many years.

Despite retiring as an LA, Frank will continue doing the bible reading at our 8am service. Thank you Frank, a great effort for a man in his 90's.

WELCOME REV. DR. DAVID PETTETT

David Pettett has recently settled on the Sunshine Coast and has joined us at HTK Church after being granted a licence by the Archbishop to officiate at our church.

David was ordained in 1978 and has had a long and varied ministry. He has ministered in inner city, suburban and NSW South Coast parishes. David has served with the Overseas Missionary Fellowship, church planting in Japan. He was a Chaplain in the Royal Australian Navy, as well as in hospitals and prisons. He later managed prison and hospital chaplaincy in the Anglican Diocese of Sydney.

In "retirement" David works for the Australian College of Theology moderating pastoral and parish focused ministry subjects. He has had three locum positions in Central Queensland parishes and now teaches at the Bishop Patteson Theological College in the Solomon Islands.

David has settled at Kawana Island but is hopeful of returning to Solomon Islands as soon as borders re-open.



Annual Meeting

The Parish Annual Meeting was held at HTK Church on 28 February.

Fr Steve opened the meeting with the observation that, although HTK had a well-developed strategic plan which was being implemented, Covid meant that churches had to be tactical rather than strategic. We were challenged to respond to God's call as opportunities were presented – big or small.

The various reports are in the papers distributed to parishioners and won't be repeated in this article. Some highlights of the various reports are:

- ◆ Navigating the various changes required by Government and Diocesan Covid requirements put a huge strain on Fr Steve and the leadership team
- ◆ Technology allowed the continuation of services on-line during the shutdown. Thank you to all involved in providing those services. Great steps forward were made.
- ◆ Unfortunately, a number of parish councillors were not able to continue in 2021
- ◆ We were all encouraged to volunteer for a roster as too much is expected from too few. Period of volunteer service is only for one year.
- ◆ Anglicare had moved out of their office in the hall. This has had a major impact on our finances, but has given us access to more space.
- ◆ The parish has been the recipient of the Government Job Keeper subsidy during the Covid period, more than making up for loss of offertory income during the shutdown. Job Keeper finishes in March 2021.
- ◆ The budget for 2021 includes an increase in maintenance spending to keep the church, hall and surrounds in good condition.
- ◆ The parish pays an allowance to the Wockners who now live in their own home. The rectory is being rented out. The surplus of rent received over the housing allowance is being allocated to a fund to keep the Rectory in good condition.
- ◆ There were break-ins in both the hall (when electronic equipment belonging to Helping Hands was stolen), and the church (when gifts for the Anglicare foster children and articles belonging to Kijiji were stolen). Security cameras have been installed in both the church and the hall.
- ◆ Kidz Kinect playgroup has been highly successful, with the church full of happy children and parents.

SIMNEL CAKE



A Simnel cake is a type of fruit cake that contains plenty of marzipan and is eaten at Easter, although it used to be specifically associated with Mothering Sunday. When folk were fasting during Lent, Mothering Sunday, appearing in the middle of the fast, offered a respite from 40 days of religious austerity.

Mothering Sunday occurs on the fourth Sunday of Lent; a special day when people visited their mother church or cathedral. Don't confuse Mothering Sunday with Mothers' Day; it is only in the last century that this day is associated with showing enforced appreciation to our mums (though I assume that you met up with your mother on return to your original diocese).

Like most British food eaten during winter and early spring, the Simnel cake contains lots of dried fruit, but it is much lighter than boozy Christmas cake and contains a layer of marzipan both on top and within, and is decorated with eleven marzipan balls, each symbolising Jesus's disciples (minus the treacherous Judas of course).

To trace the origin of Simnel cake, you need to go right back to mediaeval times where it began life as a yeast-leavened bread, which may or may not have been enriched. This doesn't sound that much like a special bread, you may think, but what made it special is that it was made out of the highest quality flour possible; *simnel* derives from the Latin *simila* – the whitest and finest of flours.

Fast forward to the 17th and 18th centuries, and the bread mixture had been swapped for a pudding batter, not dissimilar to spotted dick, enriched with dried fruit, spices and almonds. It would be boiled like a pudding. When cooked, it was wrapped in pastry, glazed with egg and baked until a good hard crust formed. It would be like the Scottish black bun, a traditional Christmas food north of the border.

It is only when you get to the tail end of the 19th century that it starts to look like something we would recognise as a cake, though surprisingly it is not until the 20th century that the familiar marzipan layers and decorative disciples appear.

RECIPE INGREDIENTS

for the cake:

- 225 g softened butter
- 225 g caster sugar
- 4 eggs
- 225 g plain flour
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- zest of 2 oranges
- zest of 2 lemons
- 325 g mixed fruit (currants, sultanas, currants)
- 125 g glacé cherries, quartered or left whole
- 500 g orange marzipan
- icing sugar for dusting
- apricot jam
- 1 beaten egg

for the marzipan:

- 90 g caster sugar
- 140 g icing sugar
- 220 g ground almonds
- grated zest of an orange
- 1 beaten egg



CAKE METHOD

1. Begin by greasing and lining an 8-inch cake tin and preheating your oven to 150°C.
2. In a large bowl, beat together the softened butter, caster sugar, eggs, flour, cinnamon and zests. Using a hand mixer, beat together until smooth. Now fold in the mixed fruit and cherries with a spatula or wooden spoon.
3. Spoon half of the mixture into your tin and level it off. Take a third of your marzipan and roll it out into a circle the same size as the tin, trimming away any untidy bits. Use a little icing sugar to roll the marzipan out, just like you would use flour to roll out pastry.
4. Lay the marzipan in the tin and then spoon and scrape the remainder of the cake batter on top of that. Level off with your spatula and make an indentation in the centre, so that the cake doesn't rise with too much of a peak.
5. Bake for 2 ¼ to 2 ½ hours. Use a skewer to check it is done. Cool on a rack for about 30 minutes before removing the tin and greaseproof paper.
6. When cold, roll out half of the marzipan in a circle slightly larger than the cake – the best way to do this is to use the outside edge of the tin it was baked in as a template.
7. Brush the top of the cake with some apricot jam (if it is very thick, you may want to warm some with a little water in a pan) and lay the marzipan on top, then brush the marzipan with the beaten egg. Divide the remaining marzipan and trimmings into 11 equally-sized balls and arrange them in a circle. Brush those with egg too and glaze the top using a chef's flame torch (or a very hot grill).

MARZIPAN METHOD

1. Mix all of the ingredients except for the egg in a bowl. Make a well in the centre and pour in the egg. Using a mixer or your hand, form a dough. Knead in the bowl until smooth, wrap in cling film and refrigerate for at least 2 hours.

PRIME TIME

PANCAKE TUESDAY (known as Shrove Tuesday) is the day before Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. Lent is traditionally a time of fasting and repentance, and the day before the commencement of Lent often provides a last opportunity to indulge. The tradition of pancakes on Shrove Tuesday probably comes from the need to use up foods such as flour, butter, eggs and fat which were discouraged during Lent.

At HTK we also offered options of gluten and dairy free pancakes – unheard of when the pancake tradition was starting. Of course the toppings of whipped cream, ice cream, maple syrup, jams, lemon and sugar etc were suitably decadent, so we probably met the criteria. Our celebration was a fun time of eating and enjoying each other's company, keeping Covid-safe, of course.

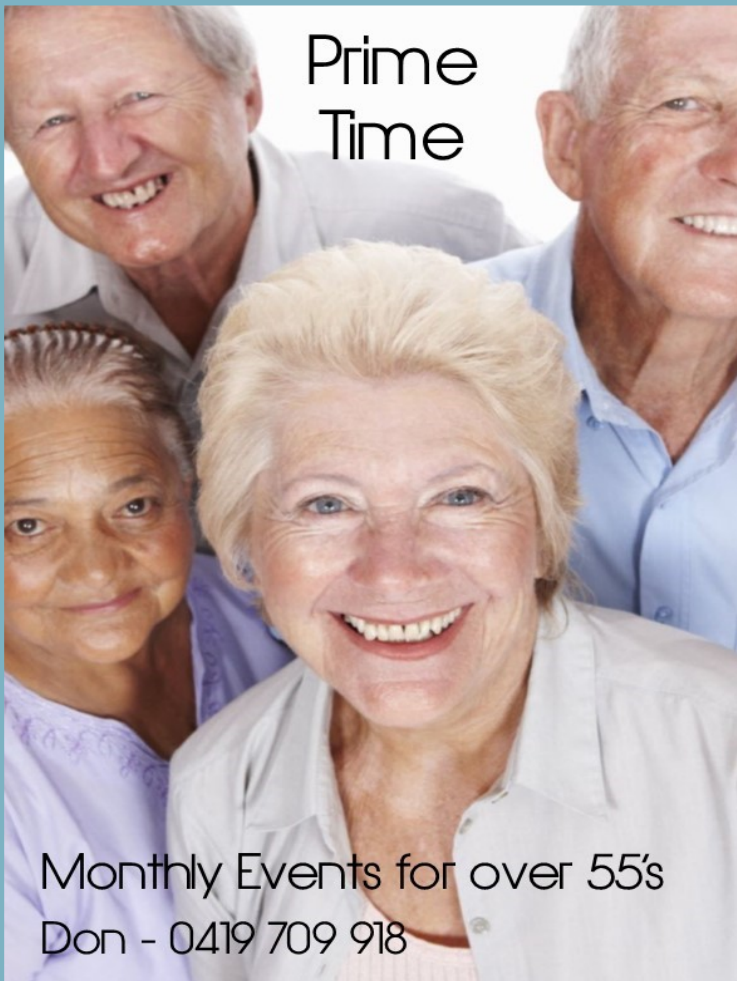

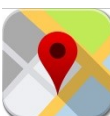
